




TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT



June 6, 2023

ADMINISTRATION:

- The town's [new website](#) allows for residents to create a log in and register to receive notifications, alerts, and other information relative to their interests. Committee members can also request "Author" permissions to edit their specific body's webpage to be published by a town staff "Administrator".



- TA Johnson attended the Spring Conference of the Massachusetts Municipal Managers Association in Brewster, MA on June 1-2, 2023.
- Town Administrator (TA) Greg Johnson and Human Resources (HR) Manager Stephanie Duggan are conducting a search for a new Town Accountant.
- TA Johnson and HR Manager Duggan are scheduled to begin regular collective bargaining agreement negotiations with NEPBA Police unions (Patrolmen and Superior Officers), and are expecting to coordinate the start of negotiations with AFSCME Clerical Union. Individual personnel employment agreements to be negotiated include: Police Chief; Deputy Police Chief; Planning Director; and, Human Resources Manager.



- TA Johnson and other officials attended the ribbon-cutting of the Assabet Co-Op Market on May 31, 2023.
- The Town Clerk's Office may be closed on June 8-9, 2023 while the office's staff attends the annual Massachusetts Town Clerk's Association (MTCA) conference.
- Town offices will be closed on Monday, June 19, 2023 in observance of Juneteenth.



- Thanks to all of the veterans, volunteers, civic organizations, residents and visitors that helped with the Memorial Day event this year on May 29, 2023.



- TA Johnson and staff and official attended the annual Legislative Breakfast of the regional planning agency, MAPC and its sub-group MAGIC on Thursday, May 25, 2023, hosted at the Sanctuary. Representatives Hogan, Sena, Cataldo, and Gentile also attended.

COUNCIL ON AGING:

- The Council on Aging is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The COA provides information and referral for supportive services including home care, health insurance counseling, fuel assistance, food resources, housing, legal issues, public assistance programs and transportation. The Council on Aging accepts and lends durable medical equipment.
- The Council on Aging van service provides transportation Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Destinations include medical appointments, grocery shopping, banks, and salons. Special trips include Walmart in Hudson and Savers thrift store in Marlborough.
- The Council on Aging Board and the Friends of Maynard Seniors co-sponsored a “Conversation and Coffee” with Maynard School Committee members Mary Brannelly and Natasha Rivera. Over thirty seniors attended a robust discussion of the Green Meadow School project.
- The Council on Aging co-sponsored two special presentations with the Maynard Library: “Doug Tallamy: The Nature of Oaks” and Blue Cross Blue Shield’s “Planning for Medicare: Countdown to 65.” Both programs were held at the Maynard Library. The Council on Aging continues sponsorship of an elder law series provided by Generations Law Group. These programs occur at the Maynard Library in the evening.

- Fire Chief Angela Lawless provided two CPR classes for seniors at the Maynard Fire Station.



- Assabet Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School provided technical assistance to seniors for computer, tablets and smart phone issues.



- Maynard seniors attended community musical performances at the Groton Hill Music Center.
- Multiple “Mystery Tours” included a scenic drive, socializing with new friends and old, and a stop at Johnson’s Restaurant and Dairy Bar in Groton.

- Alicia Dixon MS, RDN, LDN, Registered Dietitian from Emerson Hospital, is providing a health and wellness article for the Council on Aging newsletter. April/May's topic was on the risk of dehydration in older adults.
- In addition to pickleball at the Assabet Valley Boys & Girls Club sponsored by the Council on Aging, Maynard seniors are enjoying the new pickleball opportunity at the Maynard High School's basketball courts. Many thanks to David Schwind for all his efforts on bringing pickleball to Maynard!
- We hosted a tour for Minuteman students this month. The new station, apparatus, and firefighters were a big hit and they have already called for a return trip. It was as special as a day for the firefighters on duty as it was the students that toured. We are looking forward to seeing them again soon.



- Training this month we sent another three members to the joint two-day ASHER (Active Shooter, Hostile Event Response) drill sponsored by NERAC with firefighters, police, and dispatchers. The entire department also attended ASHER training for the entire department as part of EMS training this month. We have started a new collaboration with training once a month between Fire, Police, and Dispatch. We will be meeting in different locations around the community pre-planning any incidents we may respond to and looking at the property from both points of view.



- Fire Fighter Gross is working on becoming our in-house technical rescue expert, he will train the entire department when completed. He attended Confined Space & Rescue class this month in Hyannis for five days. We have recently obtained equipment for confined space from a grant from the town's liability insurance provider, MIIA.

Curfew Bell Dedication Ceremony

On May 6, the Maynard Historic Commission held a ceremony to celebrate the new home of the Maynard Curfew Bell at the Library. The bell was cast in the former Paul Revere Foundry in Boston by Henry Northey Hooper in 1856. It was bought for the Assabet Manufacturing Company and was rung to remind mill workers to be at home and in bed. When the mill closed, the bell was moved to a local church, and when the church recently closed, the bell was moved to the Library, where the public can now view it on the 2nd floor. The ceremony was attended by Select Board Members Jeff Swanberg and Justine St. John, and State Representative Kate Hogan, who presented a proclamation from the House. The Commission also honored local historian Paul Boothroyd for all he has done over the years to preserve the history of Maynard.

Book Sale on June 17




