CHAPTER 87—REGIONAL INFORMATION SESSION

Chapter 87 of the General Laws has been amended to add an important new provision, Section 14. Signed by the House and Senate on January 3 and by the Governor on January 13, new Section 14 went into effect in April 2011 following the mandated 90-day comment period new legislation.

Section 14 provides for the option for electric utilities to file—with each city and town—an annual vegetation management plan for local distribution line clearance. Tree Wardens and other town officials need to be aware of and understand this option and how it will affect their communities.

Massachusetts Tree Wardens and Foresters Association (MTWFA), National Grid, and NRECA invite you to attend this Regional Session. The presentation is designed to help municipalities understand and discuss Chapter 87 and specifically the changes provided for in Section 14.



Re; Town Administrator Report

Honorable Board of Selectmen,

Please accept this report as an abridged version of Town Hall activities in recent weeks;

Vacation; It was nice and now I am back.

Solar Project; As you are aware the legislation was amended as it went through the Senate causing this project to require Article 97 (open space regulations) to be considered. Therefore we must negotiate with DEP to offer land that is equal or greater in both size and value to be placed into deeded restrictions. I have identified two parcels assigned to the DPW listed on Great Road, but could be more commonly recognized as being behind 129 Parker Street.

Presently we are discussing with DEP if these properties or a portion there of will meet the expectations of the law and be acceptable to that agency as compensation for the landfill.

Simultaneously we are working with the contractor EPG to make any adjustments allowed by law and not to adversarial to the citizens of Maynard. We are getting closer to a start date, but unfortunately there is final date for completion.

Police Chief Search; As discussed at our recent meeting the vetting process for the candidates continues and the interviews are being scheduled for the evenings of September 11 and 12, they will begin at 6 PM both evenings. The goal is to have a Chief of Police under agreement and preferably on the job by October 1st. Background and reference checks continue to be performed on all potential candidates, the finalist names will be released from the vetting process on September 10 publicly posted on www.townofmaynard.net.

It is critically important that we are able to gather as much information through professionally through background and reference checks before release. We also would like to protect the applicants, as this is an equally stressful time for them as they way through their decision.

All of these steps are to insure that Maynard and the BOS has as much of the available information about candidates to bring the best leader to the community.

Maynardfest Alteration of Premises; As you know by now it has come to my attention that there is an additional step we must take to allow outdoor seating at licensed establishments during the Octoberfest portion of the day (11 AM to 3PM). There must be a public hearing of the Local Licensing Authority (BOS) duly processed, abutters must be notified and a vote following said public hearing be taken by the LLA to approve, disapprove and/or limit the allowance.

At this time we are working to schedule that hearing during the September 18th meeting. I have been in direct contact with the ABCC on this matter and as always will assist in doing our best to meet all criteria and requirements. The interested parties are Pleasant Café, Halfway Café and Main Street Liquors.

Main Street Liquors is looking to display and retail packaged goods, offer "tastings" (within Mass regulations) and market the store. There will be no open container consumption, but if some responsible adult wants to purchase a nice bottle of wine to consume later as they sit on their porch watching the fireworks then have at it.

MIAA Board Seminar; Please note that my recent three day seminar with MIAA was informative, helpful and extra dry. On Monday there were three different actuaries who addressed us on three riveting topics. Did you know that lighting strike claims have increased fivefold in the last ten years? Let's just say there moments I was hoping there would be some electricity in the room.

The good news is MIAA is well aware of the need to compete and we had some good conversation about the improbability of the GIC being able to continue to attract new clients without significantly increasing rates long term. The unfunded portion of cost continues to grow for that health insurance device. However, MIAA by observation and in partnership with BC/BS have recognized the need to create a local network plan to compete with some of the low cost offerings from Tufts Navigator. There will be an increased effort going forward by BC/BS to have members understand the importance of healthy life styles and further education as to plan offerings to that end.

Sidewalk Update; The upgrade and investment in the sidewalks system on both Great Road and Waltham Street is inching towards completion. As you can imagine there are numerous opinions on every aspect of the effort for curbstones to crosswalks and mailboxes to material, but overwhelmingly the reaction has been positive and the kinks will be worked out.

Town Hall Upgrades and Re-Organization Efforts; Work on the first floor area and the fire suppression system is progressing and we have a target date of completion of September 15. The public reaction has been positive with most suggesting that they like to see the Town Hall maintained.

The re-org and the associated upgrades, both organizationally and structurally are near completion and people are settling into new roles and protocols. We continue to fine tune the process.

Professional Development Afternoon; We recently had a very successful team building and employee roundtable session on Friday August 24th to discuss upcoming deadlines and expectations. While I believe the cooperation level continues to grow, there is too many who non-believers remaining. One of the primary areas of focus for the management team is to continue to convert those employees by making them witness the miracle of change.

There was a outdoor lunch where all public employees were feted with burgers, hot dogs and other summer delicacies. Then town hall employees met in the MJG Room to discuss municipal wide issues, we then broke into three groupings, buildings and grounds, finance and municipal services. It is a very effective way of keeping people up to speed.

responds to chemical, biological and radiological releases and large-scale national emergencies, including homeland security incidents. EPA conducts short term cleanups in the removal program when necessary to protect human health and the environment by either funding response actions directly or overseeing and enforcing actions conducted by potentially responsible parties.



INTRO:

On August 27th at approximately 12:00, the Maynard Fire Department was notified of an open container of Mercury at a residence on Martin Street. Upon discovery of the mercury the regional hazardous materials team was activated. Further investigation revealed a number of chemicals stored in the basement. The EPA was brought in to begin clean-up operations. The Maynard Fire Department, Maynard Board of Health, and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are coordinating a removal of hazardous material including mercury and other chemicals. At this time, there is no threat to public safety or to public health.

BACKGROUND

EPA is working to remove hazardous chemicals that were found in a residence in Maynard, MA. On August 27, 2012, the Hazardous Materials Response Division of the Massachusetts Department of Fire Services requested EPA assistance at the residence. EPA responders arrived on-scene to assess the situation on August 27th, and on August 28th work crews began working to remove the hazardous materials. Most of the chemicals were stored in the basement of the home on Martin Street, and the first job of the crews was to create a work zone in the basement to assess, organize and remove chemicals. Crews will evaluate the residence for hazardous materials in the coming days.

CHEMICALS OF CONCERN

One of the most prominent chemical of concern is mercury found in an open container in the basement of the residence. Elevated levels of mercury have been detected in the indoor air. Crews are working to clean the residence using air ventilation and other mercury removal techniques.

There were other chemicals found in the residence, including toluene, ammonium hydroxide, hydrochloric acid, vanadium pentoxide, lithium metal, and ammonium nitrate. These chemicals will also be removed from the residence and do not currently pose a risk to human health.

EPA RESPONSE ACTION

EPA has been responding to the situation since August 27th, and will continue to work at the residence until the chemicals are safely removed from the property. EPA response workers will have multiple vehicles parked outside the site, including a chemical storage box that will be used to safely take the chemicals off site. The Maynard Fire Department provided a fire truck and crew on-scene for the first few days of the response. They will continue to work closely with the EPA responders throughout the entire response action.

Press Release

On August 27th at approximately 12:00, the Maynard Fire Department was notified of an open container of Mercury at a residence on Martin Street. The container was discovered by a neighbor of the resident while cleaning in her basement. Initially it was believed that there were chemicals being stored in a small amount of covered containers in the basement. Upon discovery of the mercury the regional hazardous materials team was activated. Further investigation revealed a number of chemicals being stored in the basement and in the garage. The EPA was brought in to begin clean-up operations.

The Maynard Fire Department (FD), Maynard Board of Health, and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are coordinating a removal of hazardous material mercury and other compounds at a Martin Street address. At this time there is no threat to public safety or public health. The property is private property and the owner is cooperating fully with all agencies. Citizens are instructed not to enter the property or grounds without consent from the authorities (EPA) prior. The resident's shelter needs are being accommodated by friends.

The removal of potentially hazardous is being monitored and overseen by the EPA with appropriate analysis and "best practices" in place. The process is ongoing until all material has been removed and disposed of properly. We encourage all citizens to avoid the area if possible to allow the abatement team to do their work without hindrance.

The suspicious containers and material was discovered by a neighbor of the resident while removing collected debris and material. This person took the proper and immediate step of notifying the Maynard Fire Department and upon the FD observing the suspicious "collected material". Chief Anthony Stowers worked with the Massachusetts Director of Hazardous Materials and contacted the appropriate local, state and federal authorities. We would ask anyone who

finds material suspicious or foreign, particularly chemicals and compounds to notify the police or fire immediately before removal, for more complete steps you may take when coming upon suspicious material, please visit www.townofmaynard.net .

The EPA will remain involved post clean up. All persons involved are trained and certified professionals in hazardous material removal. The Town would like to thank our local responders, Police, Fire and the Department of Public Works and the state and federal partners, particularly DEP and EPA for their efforts to avert disaster.
